Guidelines: Purpose of the Henry County Agriculture Hall of Fame is to recognize outstanding contributions by an individual to agriculture. Annual awards to the Hall of Fame will honor men, women, or couples who have made outstanding contributions to agriculture.

Recipients & number of the awards made in any year may not exceed four and the number of posthumous award is normally not to exceed

1.) Farmer - one who has made his/ her major contribution from the land and the products thereof, or livestock. 2.) Agriculture - Related activity - AgriBusiness

Recipients must have made their major contributions in Henry County, and should have had long tenure in their field of endeavor, preferably 25 years.

Nominations may be made by any individual or organization in Ohio by completing a nomination form and returning it to the Agriculture Hall of Fame Committee at the Henry County Fair Office, P.O. Box 387, Napoleon, OH 43545. All applications are due July 1st.

All nominations must be submitted on a properly prepared form. Such forms will be printed and available through the Agriculture Hall of Fame Committee.

Selection each year will be made by the Henry Co. Hall of Fame Committee. The decision of the judges shall be final, and be completed by August 1 each year or as designated by the Hall of Fame Committee.

The 2024 awards presentation will be at 2:30 p.m. Sunday, August 11th in the Ag Hall.

The award shall be determined by the Hall of Fame Committee with proper citation annually.

Following selections, the remaining nominations will be kept on file for consideration the following year.

- 7. No open fires, except on Huddle Road camping spots. Fires must be contained within a fire ring.
- 8. Curfew is 11:30 p.m. Campers must be at their camper and quiet. Golf carts/ORV's must be parked from 11:30p.m. until daylight.
- 9. NO SUBLETTING ALLOWED. IF CAUGHT SUBLETTING THE PERSON(S) ON THE CAMPING CONTRACT WILL BE SUBJECT TO LOSING THEIR CAMPING SPOT.

10. CAMPING SPOTS ARE NOT TO BE LEFT EMPTY. IF YOU ARE UNABLE TO BRING A CAMPER TO PUT ON YOUR SPOT YOU MUST NOTIFY THE FAIR OFFICE BY ONE WEEK BEFORE OPENING DAY. FAILING TO DO SO COULD RESULT IN LOSING YOUR CAMPING SPOT.

11. All 2024 campers must renew for 2025 camping during normal fair office hours by Tuesday of fair week to keep their spot. On Wednesday of fair week 2024 campers can request to move if any spots are available. Huddle Road campers can move to open

Huddle Road spots only. Inside campers can move to open Huddle Road or open inside spots. INSIDE CAMPER LENGTH IS LIMITED TO 35 FEET PER THE FIRE MARSHALL (Over length campers approved for inside camping prior to 2017 are grandfathered.) New campers can be added to Huddle Road waiting list anytime. We have a waiting list for Huddle Road campers to move inside. Inside camping spots are not available to new campers.

UNLESS they are taking over or being added to their parents' spot. To do so they must be 18 and go on the waiting list for a spot. Once they get to the top of the waiting list they can be added to their parents' spot. Spots can only be transferred in this manner and only from parent to child.

The Henry County Fair board will allow anyone with a current camping spot to voluntarily relinquish their spot for the 2024 fair and have their lot rent be credited to the 2025 fair lot rent. Spots made available in this manner will be assigned to those campers being displaced by the construction of the new building (for 2024 only). Campers who wish to relinquish their spot for the 2024 fair must notify the camping committee by June 1st. 2024.

- 7. In case of a tie, there will be a pull-off to determine the winner.
- 8. There will be four classes of contestants as follows:
- Class 1: 25 to 43 pounds, Class 2: 44 to 59 pounds, Class 3: 60 to 75 pounds, Class 4: 76 to 100 pounds
- 9. Both boys and girls are eligible to enter: age limit of 12 years old.

- 10. Prizes will be given to each winner. 11. The judge's decision will be final for all pulls.
- 12. All contestants must be present by the time of pedal pull, with a signed permission slip and a signed insurance waiver in hand. The required signature of parent or guardian releases Tinora Young Farmers and the Henry County Agricultural Society from any financial responsibility due to accident
- 13. Registration for the tractor pull will be done one hour before pedal pull time (noon at the Entertainment Pavilion), and a \$2 entry fee will be charged.
- 14. Spectators please bring your own lawn chairs.
- 15. Spectators need to stay seated in the stands or lawn chairs.



Hey ya'll! I'm Jake Hoot, Champion of Season 17 of The Voice.

I am a Texas born, Dominican Republic raised, Tennessee living, country music playing, songwriting, God fearing, family raising, people loving, super blessed kinda guy.

In 2019, I auditioned for NBC's The Voice, and wouldn't ya know, somehow, I won the whole thing! Since then, I have been touring, writing, recording and releasing a lot of music!

Some of the songs I've written and released include Tennessee Strong, which reached top 10 in the iTunes Country Singles chart, and I Would've Loved You, featuring my dear friend Kelly Clarkson, which reached No. 3 on the iTunes Country Singles Chart! Other hits include, Best Job I Ever Had, an ode to my daughters, and my album Love Out Of Time, which

reached No. 2 on both the iTunes All-Genre Albums and Country Albums charts.

These are just a few, but there are so many more so please check them out.

Beyond the music, Kelly Clarkson and I released a music video for I Would've Loved You to critical acclaim, including 8 million YouTube views and a feature on the TODAY Show with Hoda & Jenna. You may have seen the music video on CMT, where it remains in rotation, or perhaps you've seen live performances of Kelly and I on The Kelly Clarkson Show.

My band and I have become quite the road warriors. We get to play often at The Grand Ole Opry, and have been blessed to open shows for some legendary acts including Alabama, Darius Rucker, Jordan Davis, and so many other artists and friends.



It was "19(90) Somethin" when Grand Ole Opry member Mark Wills went from singing at Atlanta's infamous Buckboard to releasing his first of 19 Billboard-charting singles across seven albums. While climbing his musical 'ladder,' he has recorded Gold and Platinum albums and released some of the most enduring and recognizable Country Music hits of the last 25 Years."Wish You Were Here," "Jacob's Ladder" and "I Do (Cherish You)" cemented his country status in the late '90s and at the 'dawning of a new decade' in the early '00s. "Jacob's Ladder" was released via Mercury Nashville in May 1996 as Wills' debut single, and it became the singer's first of eight Top 10 hits. His debut self-titled album followed "full of rambunctious good-time songs teeming with sly wit and bittersweet ballads -all in a baritone that throbs with emotion" per Entertainment Weekly. Billboard Hot Country Songs chart Top 5 hits: "Places I've Never Been," "Î Do (Cherish You)," "Don't Laugh at Me," and No. 1 single "Wish You Were Here" hit the airwaves between 1997-1999. Fittingly, Wills' early chart success earned him an Academy of Country Music Award for Top New Male Vocalist in 1998. One of his biggest hits to date is the RIAA Gold-certified "19 Somethin" -a six-week No. 1 on the Billboard Hot Country Songs chart.In 2022, Mark rerecordedand releasedhis hit "Don't Laugh at Me" with the acapella recording group, Home Free featuring Mark's daughter, Macey. In conjunction with this release, a new music video was filmed staring 21 Pineapples' Nate Smith and JennaLee Wasserman earning the collaborators 3 Gold Telly Awards.

A must see at the fair for young and old alike is the Depot.


The office area of the depot has many display cases filled with toy tractors, trucks and old farm equipment. This display is sponsored by the Maumee Valley Retired Iron Club.

Float entries that do not decorate the entry in keeping with the current parade "theme" will be eliminated from the float judging contest and will not be eligible for any prize monies or ribbons.

#### **Contestant Eligibility:**

All drivers must be able to operate all controls of the tractor from the driver's seat. Minimum age of contestants is 16 years of age. Said minors must submit written consent of parents or guardian prior to entering contest. Parents/guardians of minors recognize that they will be held responsible for any accident or injury incurred or caused by sponsored juvenile or his/her tractor. Each and every contestant enters at his/her own risk. All contestants shall release any and all pull officials from responsibility or claim for any liability at noted competition. Stock Classification Requirements:

- 1. No front weight frame or weight may extend more than 144" (12ft.) from the center of the rear axle.
- 2. All tractors must be equipped with a hood and grill of stock appearance.
- 3. All tractors cannot be more than 10% over factory high idle (RPM).
- 4. All tractors must have a working governor and will be tach checked; tach operator decisions will be final.
- 5. Engine must have stock block or factory replacement block for noted make and model of tractor.

#### General Requirements:

- 1. Tractors must run rubber tires. No four-wheel drive or front assist. No duals, tire chains, or studs permitted. No cutting of the leading edge of the tire bar or casing allowed. All power must be transmitted through wheels.
- 2. Minimum drawbar length to be 18" from center of rear wheels to point of hook. Drawbar to be stationary in all directions. Maximum drawbar height to be 20" from top of bar to parallel point



- 3. Drawbar must be equipped with steel hitching device not more than 1.5" thick (min. of 7/8" thick) and with a 3 5/8" diameter opening. Pulling point may not be more than 1.5" from back edge of hitching device.
- 4. No pressurized fuels allowed in anything other than U.L. approved canisters. No oxygen or water injection allowed. No secondary fuels or tanks allowed.
- 5. No portion of tractor may interfere with sled during pull.
- 6. All weights must be safely secured to tractor and may not extend beyond tires (factory installed quick hitch excepted). Any ballast or external parts lost while hooked to sled during pull will be cause for disqualification (internal parts excepted).
- 7. All tractors must be equipped with working rear-wheel brakes.
- 8. Use of torque amplifiers, automatic shifts will be permitted.
- 9. Tractor must be field serviceable.
  Safety:
- 1. Front wheels shall not be more than 36" off ground at any time.
- 2. Tractors must be operated in safe manner at all times.3. Operator must remain seated
- during pull and must be in complete control of tractor at all times.
- 4. Any consumption of alcohol prior to pulling will result in disqualification.
  - 5. All tractors must pass safety in-

spection.

- 6. Tractors must immediately stop upon signal from judge/flagger. Pull considered complete when forward motion of sled ceases.
- 7. Any loss of tractor fluids will be cause for disqualification except for that caused by internal engine breakage.
- 8. Tractors must be in neutral or park while being hitched and unhitched from
- Wheelie bars and kill-switch recommended, but not required.

#### Operation of Pull:

- 1. Each tractor may enter multiple classes, but only once per class. The participant and/or tractor may not compete in both the county and open events in the same weight class. This also applies to the 6,500 pound open/6,000 pound county class.
- 2. Number one puller will be designated test puller. He has option of accepting pull, if weight machine is ok, or rejecting pull and re-pulling in number three position. If weight machine is adjusted, first puller after adjustment becomes number one puller and has same options. All re-pull decisions must be made prior to unhooking from sled.
- 3. Contestant must pull in position drawn; intentional delay will mean disqualification.
- 4. All pulls must start with a tight hitch; no jerking permitted. Contestants will be allowed two (2) attempts not over 50' distance to start sled. Distances will

be measured from the front edge of sled.

- 5. Tractors must remain within marked boundaries of course during pull attempt or will be disqualified. The sled does not have to remain within markers.
- 6. This will be a speed limit pull. Speed limit will be 4 m.p.h. for all classes. (Speed subject to change.)

#### General Rules:

- 1. Violation of any rule shall constitute disqualification.
- 2. Contest to be governed by judge(s) and/or pull committee, with all decisions being final. Officials have the right to stop and disqualify any tractor if it is being operated in any manner deemed unsafe.
- 3. The top three (3) finishers in each class may be re-inspected for the following: a.RPM; b.Drawbar height; c.Weight of tractor.

If top finishers are disqualified thru tech, next highest finishing tractors may be checked until three (3) are qualified for class. Judges may randomly check any money winner (in addition to top three). Any competitor entered in the class can protest another entry in the class by posting \$50 cash. This will be forfeited to the protested entrant if found to be legal or returned to the protestor if entrant is illegal. Protest must be made before the official completion of the class. 

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## **Rules Governing Fair**

- 1. The office at the fairgrounds will be open weekdays July 24th thru August 3rd from 11:00 am - 7:00 pm and Saturdays 9:00 am - 12:00 Noon. The office will be open August 5th thru August 15th from 8:00 am - 8:00 pm. All entries must be made in accordance with division rules. Exhibit must have been judged and designated a winner in the judge's book to insure payment of premium.
- 2. Exhibitors of livestock must procure stalls and exhibitor/season tickets before making entries. No bedding will be furnished.
- 3. Exhibitors of livestock shall not occupy stall or pen unless by permis-
- 4. No stall considered occupied unless the animal in same shall be entered and exhibited for premium.
  - 5. Entries must be in owner's name.
- 6. No entry shall be changed on day of exhibition unless the secretary is satisfied that an error has been made in original entry. No animal, fowl or article may win more than one individual premium but may compete in group exhibited by owner or breeder.
- 7. No premium will be awarded with or without competition in any department unless the judge considers the exhibit worthy of an award.
- 8. All service and delivery trucks are required to have a permit. No deliveries after 10 a.m.
- 9. Exhibit must have been judged and designated a winner in the judge's book to insure payment of premium.

10. No exhibit shall be removed

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- before the close of the exhibition without permission of the superintendent in charge of that department. Exhibits removed without permission forfeit premium.
- 11. Directors acting as superintendent are empowered to decide all questions not covered by these rules arising in their respective departments.
- 12. The Society will take reasonable precautions to prevent accidents and preserve order but will in no case be responsible for injury to persons or damage to or loss of property or exhibits while on the grounds.
- 13. Entries properly tagged will be assigned proper places by superintendent of departments.
- 14. Charges of fraud in making entries must be made in writing and presented to the secretary at time of fair and premiums will be withheld pending an investigation by the Board of Directors.
- 15. First premium, blue: Second. red: Third, white: Fourth, green: Fifth. pink; Champion, blue ribbon: Grand Champion, purple ribbon. All premiums will be paid in full if there are sufficient funds remaining after paying incidental expenses. Otherwise, premiums will be paid pro rata.
- 16. All animals must be exhibited in such places and at such times as the superintendent -in charge shall direct.
- 17. Any fraud or misrepresentation detected before or after awards have been made, or any disrespect to or statements made to influence judges, shall cause the forfeiture of any or all

premiums awarded to offending exhib-

- 18. No premium ribbons or cards taken at other fairs will be allowed to be displayed on any exhibit until after the exhibit shall have been passed upon by judges.
- 19. Judges shall award no premiums to exhibits not in the premium list.
- 20. Judges will permit only superintendent and grooms in the show ring and will report all offenses.

#### ADMISSION AND FEES

- 21. All grooms, herdsmen and helpers will be required to purchase admission tickets. Permits to remain on grounds will be issued to persons having privileges. Those not provided for must vacate the grounds or purchase tickets.
- 22. Exhibitor's/season tickets \$25. 23. All horses are brought on the grounds at the owner's risk. Neither
- the Henry County Agricultural Society nor the Henry County Commissioners, under any circumstances, will be liable or responsible for losses, injuries or damages sustained by owners, drivers, horses, mules or ponies entered and participating in or warming up for any event (or contest). All risks involved in connection therewith must be assumed in full by the owners and drivers in the entries, their servants, employees and or agents.
- 24. Membership tickets, \$2; Single admission, \$10, Season//exhibitor tickets, \$30; All children 12 and under. free. Henry County residents 80 years old and older may receive a free pass for the fair at the Entry Office.\*Free parking available in the Huddle Road lot or the lot east of SR 108. Henry County Agricultural Society membership tickets are on sale at the Henry

County Fair Office, during regular hours or may be purchased from the secretary from December 15, 2023 through September 30, 2024. Henry County residents who are holders of membership tickets are entitled to vote at the annual election held Wed., Nov. 13, 2024.

- 25. All exhibitors (except 4-H, FFA and FHA and youth under 13 as of Jan. 1) showing in open competition shall be required to purchase an exhibitor's/ season ticket.
- 26. Charges for pens and stalls for all open class entries will be assessed according to the information found in the individual division articles.
- 27. Each department will expect courteous and orderly conduct by all exhibitors, parents, family members, and volunteers. Harassments, profanity, or unsportsmanlike conduct toward exhibitors Junior or Senior Fair Officials department superintendents or judges will not be tolerated. Any violation of this rule will result in, but is not limited to, removal from the activity and/or the fairgrounds for the day, entire week of fair or could result in a lifetime ban from the Henry County
- 28. No swimming pools, couches, overstuffed chairs, ice machines or extra appliances (except camping refrigerator paid in advance) are allowed.
- 29. All large trucks and trailers should park in the parking lot east of SR 108 at the far east end of the lot.

#### GOLF CARTS/ORVs

All golf carts/ORV must be registered at the Fair Office. No one under 16 may drive a golf cart/ORV. If you allow someone under 16 to drive your golf cart/ORV, your permit may be revoked. No golf carts/ORVs allowed allowed in buildings or barns. No golf carts/ORVs allowed on the midway after 10 a.m. See other Restricted Areas for golf carts/ORVs highlighted on the map. No motor scooters or dirt bikes allowed on fairgrounds or Ag Society property. No golf carts/ORVs can be used after quiet time of 11:30 p.m. through daylight except for security and fair officials. Lights must be on at dusk and dark. Golf cart/ORV permits will be issued and must be visibly displayed on the front of the golf cart/ORV at all times. If the permit is not properly displayed, your privledge may be forfeited. All golf cart/ORV permit holders must provide a certificate of liability from their insurance company covering the Henry County Agricultural Society before their permit is issued.

IF ANY RULES ARE VIOLAT-ED YOUR PRIVILEGE TO USE THE GOLF CART/ORV MAY BE FORFEITED AT THE DISCREC-TION OF THE FAIR BOARD DI-RECTOR.





- 2. Tack stalls are by request only. but not guaranteed. To request a tack stall you must have a minimum of four head. Empty stalls will be evaluated as community tack stalls. Please be courteous of others.
- Only register as many head as you are bringing. If purposely regis-

tered incorrectly for extra stalls you can be charged a \$25.00 penalty fee.

- 3. All animals registered to be in barn must be shown (no boarding)
- 4. All animals are in the public eve and must be fed, watered, exercised and maintained accordingly. Please keep stalls neat and clean. Fair board members should not get any complaints or comments.
- 5. Actual class registration will be from 7/22-8/1/24 in the Fair Entry Office. You must fill out an entry form and list your classes at this time and not with the Director just prior to the fair. If you are not signed up by 8/1/24 you may be considered a non exhibitor and unable to show. Call if you have any questions.



Amateur classes are open to anyone who grows flowers and plants for pleasure only, not for the purpose of a livelihood.

Each entry must be accompanied by an exhibitor's tag correctly filled in with the name, exhibitor number and class number. Exhibitors may enter as many classes as they wish in either one or both shows.

No responsibility is assumed for exhibits, other property or injury. Personal property should be marked with owner's name and address.

Judging will be by the Standard System of the Ohio Association of Garden Clubs (OAGC). At the discretion of the judge, first, second and third places will be awarded for each class, plus honorable mentions for Junior Division. The judge's decision is final.

During judging, no one will be allowed to touch, remove or rearrange any exhibit without the consent of the director.

During judging, exhibitors are asked to not engage in conversation with the judge, except during oral judging of designs.

ARTISTIC DESIGN RULES

Artistic classes are open to anyone other than professional arrangers.

All plant materials MUST be listed on the front of the entry tag or a 3"x5" card. Entry tags should include variety names, if known.

Live and dried materials may be obtained from any source for arrangements. Fresh plant material must be predominant, unless otherwise stated. No silk or plastic plant materials may be used.

Plant materials may be replaced to insure freshness; the design cannot be changed.

Incorporating - the material incorporated must be an integral part of the

Satellitic Design - A creative design with one larger design and one smaller design of the same color form and texture placed near its base, having a curving connective line that becomes a vital part of the pattern.

Underwater Design - Creative design with some components placed under water to create interest. Note, most tap water will discolor faster than bottled or distilled water.

Showing Water - Water should be viewable and an integral part of the design. This is NOT an underwater

Illuminary Design - Creative design incorporating lights. The lights must be an integral part of the design.

HENRY COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY, INC., NAPOLEON, OHIO

CONSTITUTION - NOVEMBER 30TH, 2013

ARTICLE I

This Society shall be known as the Henry County Agricultural Society, Inc., and its purpose shall be for the improvement of agriculture, domestic industry, wholesome entertainment, development of character and such other interests of the county as the Society deems proper in accordance with the Department of Agriculture.

ARTICLE II

Section 1 – The Board of Directors shall consist of 20 members, one person to be elected from Napoleon Township, one person from City of Napoleon, one person from Bartlow Township and one person from Deshler Village; and one each from the other 11 townships with five Directors-at-large coming from any township that does not have two Directors living in that township. The Board of Directors shall be elected for a term of three years and so arranged that the terms of one third of the members shall expire annually.

Section 2 – The annual meeting of the Society for the purpose of electing directors and such other business as may properly come before the meeting shall be held in the secretary's office on or before the 15th of November of each year. Balloting for directors shall be between 4 and 8 P.M. as advertised. Voting for directors by proxies is not permitted. Notice of the meeting of the Society shall be published for three weeks prior to the annual meeting and in two newspapers of general circulation and of opposite politics or mailed to each member of Society.

Section 3 – Candidates for the office of director must be members of the Society and must declare their candidacy by filing with the secretary a petition, signed by 10 or more members of the Society who are residents of Henry County, seven days before the annual election of directors is held. The official ballot shall contain only the names of those candidates who have filed their petitions as required by this section of the Constitution.

ARTICLE III

Section 1 – Only residents of Henry County 18 years of age or older

## Constitution

and who are members of the Society may vote at the annual election. Membership tickets may be procured only at the office of the secretary or from members of the Board of Directors of the Society, and only those who purchase such tickets are recognized as members of the Society. Membership tickets shall be available from December 15 to September 30. Membership tickets must be made out in the name of an individual. Neither a corporation. firm or partnership may hold a membership. The cost of a membership shall be fixed by the Board. Memberships shall at all times be available from the fair secretary. Notice of time and other places where membership certificates may be obtained to be announced in premium list and in one or more county newspapers to conform with regulations of the Ohio Department of Agriculture. Each director of the various townships has memberships to sell.

Section 2 – The Board of Directors shall, at the call of the president any time after the annual election but not later than the 15th of November, meet and elect a president, vice president.

secretary or treasurer who are members of the Society and such other officers as it may deem proper. Election of officers will be by majority vote. The president, vice president, treasurer and secretary shall be elected to serve one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The president and vice president shall be directors; the secretary and treasurer may or may not be directors. Before the election of officers is conducted, the newly elected directors shall qualify by taking an oath before a competent authority. Section 3 - The secretary shall give a bond to be approved by the Board of Directors in the sum of \$50,000 and the treasurer to give a bond in the sum of \$50,000. The president shall be custodian of the bonds.

#### ARTICLE IV

The president shall preside at all meetings of the Society and discharge such other duties as pertain to his office. The president shall be ex-officio member of all of the various committees. In his absence, the vice president shall discharge the duties of the office.

Section 1 – The secretary shall keep the roll of members, which roll shall be kept in the office of the secretary for the convenience of the public. She shall conduct the correspondence of the Society. She shall make a careful record of business done by the Board of Directors together with the reports submitted by all committees and place such records on file in a book kept for such purposes. She shall keep an itemized account of all monies paid out and for what purpose. She shall receive her receipt for the same. She shall keep a book showing from what source any monies were received by her. All books, papers, accounts, etc., pertaining to the business of the Society and Board of Directors shall be kept in the secretary's office and open to the public at all reasonable hours. His/Her salary may be withheld until after the state director of agriculture has accepted and approved the annual report of the Society.

Section 2 – The treasurer shall receive all monies from the secretary collected for membership fees or otherwise; also, she shall receive all money for tickets sold during exhibitions of the Society and make an annual report to the Board of Directors at the regular meeting. She shall receive such compensation as the Board of Directors may allow but may not receive compensation as director.

ARTICLE V

Awarding judges must be approved by the president or by the Board of Directors and approved by the superintendent of the department in which he is to function.

ARTICLE VI

The annual exhibit of the Society shall be held at the Henry County Fair-grounds at a time to be determined by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VII

Meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held at regular intervals as decided by the Board. A meeting may be called on the order of the president of the Society. In the event that the president refuses to call a meeting of the Society, the secretary shall be required to do so when requested in writing by a majority of the members of the Board.

ARTICLE VIII

The Board of Directors is empowered to make the necessary bylaws, rules and regulations which, in their opinion, they deem necessary to govern the affairs of the Society.

ARTICLE IX

Any officer or director absenting himself for three consecutive regular meetings may, upon a two-thirds vote of the Board of Directors, have his office declared vacant and his place filled by the Board.

ARTICLE X

A majority of the members of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE XI

Amendments or alterations to this Constitution may be made only at the annual meeting of the members of the Society, and a two-thirds vote of the members of the Society present shall be necessary to adopt.

ARTICLE XII

The president shall appoint two directors to act with him as the Executive Committee. This committee shall act for the Board of Directors in case of emergency. It may act as a committee to audit the books of the secretary and treasurer, or it may delegate that authority to others within or without the membership of the Society.

ARTICLE XIII

The president shall appoint two directors to act with the secretary as a committee on entertainment. This committee shall contract for attractions, music, etc.

ARTICLE XIV

The president shall appoint two members of the Board to act with him as a committee on concessions and privileges, who shall fix prices and look after collections.

ARTICLE XV

The Board of Directors may enact such rules and regulations for conducting the affairs of the Society as they deem proper which do not conflict with the Constitution or bylaws, regulations of the Ohio Department of Agriculture or laws of the State of Ohio.

ARTICLE XVI

The Board of Directors of the Society may authorize the sale of intoxicating beverages at fairgrounds events and receive revenue from the sales.

BYLAWS

Terms of directors and officers shall begin immediately after being elected and qualified no later than the 15th of November and terminate when their successor is elected and qualified. The Board of Directors shall conform to the rules and regulations of the state Board of Agriculture. All appointments of committee superintendents shall be approved by majority of the Board quorum. Any member of the Board who shall be virtue of his official position use any means to defeat an impartial award shall, on conviction, forfeit his membership. The Board shall appoint his successor. There shall be a meeting of the Board of Directors within 30 days after the closing of the annual fair. Order of business shall be as follows:



2. All entries must be homemade and intended for private, non-commercial use. Blending or addition of any commercial beer/ale is strictly

prohibited

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3. Entries will be judged according to Beer Judge Certification Program style standards (2015 revision). Complete style descriptions and information can be found at http://www.bjcp.org/ docs/2015\_Guidelines\_Beer.pdf.

4. All exhibitors must comply with Henry County Fair General Rules.

5. All exhibitors must purchase a Henry County Fair Exhibitors/Season Pass. No other entry fee is required.

6. All exhibitors must complete a Non-livestock Entry Form. The class number of each entry must be indicated in the "Class" column of the entry form. The style of the entry must be written in the "Class Description" column.

7. Exhibitors may make up to two entries in each class.

8. Exhibitors must provide two (2) bottles per entry. Bottles should be free of labels. Any type of standard closures are allowed including crown caps, fliptop (Grolsch) style stoppers and cork & wire stoppers. Caps which have logos or lettering should be blacked out. Bottles must be standard 11.2 to 16 oz. sizes. EXCEPTION: Entries in Class #7, Belgian and French Ales may be entered in bottles and seals appropriate to the style. If a 22 oz. (approx.) bottle is entered, only one (1) bottle is needed per entry.

1. Competition is open to all amateur winemakers 21 years of age and older.

2. All exhibitors must comply with Henry County Fair General Rules.

3. All exhibitors must purchase a Henry County Fair Exhibitors/Season Pass. No other entry fee is required.

4. All entries must be homemade and intended for private, non-commercial use. Wines must not be blended with commercial wines. Wines appropriate for fortification may be fortified with suitable commercial spirits.

5. Wines may be made from grapes, other fruits, berries, vegetables, grains, juices, concentrates and other suitable ingredients or blends of ingredients. Blended wines should be entered in the class that best describes the declared majority component.

6. It is the responsibility of the entrant to correctly classify his/her wine.

7. All exhibitors must complete a Non-livestock Entry Form. The class of each entry must be indicated in the "Class" column of the entry form. The main ingredients or components of the entry must be written in the "Class Description" column.

8. Exhibitors may make up to two entries in each class.

9. One bottle per entry is required. Bottles must be 750 ml. (or American equiv.) standard size and of a generally recognized wine bottle shape. EXCEPTION – ice wine may be bottled and

presented in 375 ml. splits. Bottles entered for competition should not have raised lettering or labels. Bottles may be closed with cork, screw top, or plastic stopper. Bottles must be filled so that 1" to 2" of air space remains under the fully installed top or cork.

10. Wines typically served cold should be brought to the judging cold and will be kept chilled until the judging

11. Sparkling wines should be presented in industry standard packaging. Champagne bottles with wired conventional champagne stoppers are highly recommended.

12. Entries will be judged on appearance, aroma/bouquet, finish, overall impression, taste.

13. First, second and third place premiums will be awarded in each class at the discretion of the judges based on quality of entries. Judges are not obligated to award placings or premiums if there are no worthy entries in the class. Judges decisions are final.

## Henry County Junior Fair Board Constitution

#### ARTICLE I - TITLE

This organization shall be known as the Henry County Junior Fair Board.

#### ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

The purpose of this organization shall be to promote the interests of youth by assisting in planning and the operation of the Henry County Junior Fair. At all times the Henry County Junior fair Board shall operate within the rules and regulations of the Henry County Agricultural Society and with direction of the Henry County Senior Fair Board.

#### ARTICLE III – MEMBERSHIP

A. The members of this board shall include representatives from 4-H, FFA. Farm Bureau Youth, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and/or other youth organizations exhibiting at the Henry County Fair acceptable to the Senior Fair Board. Board Representatives must meet membership guidelines and be active in the organization they represent. Membership is subject to approval of the Senior Fair Board. Method of selection of these representatives will be left to the discretion of the representative organizations.

- B. Board members must be a minimum of 13 years of age as of (Jan. of the new year) AND at least a freshman in high school.
- C. Number of representatives to serve on the board from the above organizations shall be:

4-H 30 maximum

FFA 3 per chapter (total of 12 w/ Napoleon FFA)

Boy Scouts 3 per chapter Girl Scouts 3 per chapter

Farm Bureau Youth 3 per chapter The Junior Fair Board Executive

Officers, on an individual basis, may consider membership greater than those listed.

- D. Members shall be selected to serve a one-year term, beginning in October. Officers shall be nominated and elected at the September meeting. They are eligible to serve on the board in future years as long as their obligations to the Junior Fair Board have been met and they are eligible to participate in the Henry County Junior
- Applications for 4-H representatives are available July 1st and are to be returned by September 1st to the Extension Educator, 4-H Youth Devel-
- Representatives from Farm Bureau Youth, FFA Chapters and Scouts are to be determined by September 15th each year at the discretion of the organizations and its' advisor.

- Attendance to all scheduled monthly meetings of the board is expected. Any member is permitted three (3) absences (excused and/or unexcused) total. Members are to notify the Junior Fair Board Secretary prior to meetings.
- All work sessions are considered regular meetings
- Members missing a third meeting will be notified in writing of the board member's dismissal from the board.
- In the case of the resignation or removal of a member, the member's term may be filled by appointment for the remainder of the year by the Junior Fair Board Executive Committee, with the approval of the board advisors and Senior Fair Board Junior Fair Committee
- A Code of ethics shall be read and signed by each and every Junior Fair Board member at the beginning of each term year (October). The Junior Fair Board member agrees to the terms of this code of ethics and adhere to its guidelines. The member will also accept responsibility for any and all disciplinary action deemed necessary in the event guidelines are not followed. By signing the Code of Ethics, the member agrees to uphold the current Constitution

#### ARTICLE IV - ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Advisors shall include Senior Fair Board members that make up the Junior Fair Committee; the Extension Educator, 4-H Youth Development; at least one-advisor from each of the youth organizations represented; volunteer advisors as confirmed by the Junior Fair Board Executive Committee and the Senior Fair Board. Advisors for the board must be at least 21 years of age. New advisors for the board must formally apply and submit to a background check.

Management of the Junior Fair Board will be a shared responsibility between the advisors and Extension Staff. It is recognized that the OSU Extension Program maintains a working relationship with the Senior Fair Board in conducting Junior Fair Programming an that Extension does not solely manage the Junior Fair Program.

All Junior Fair Board Advisors must read and sign the Advisor Code of Ethics annually at the beginning of each term year (October). The Junior Fair Board Advisor agrees to the terms of this code of ethics and adhere to its guidelines. The member will also accept responsibility for any and all disciplinary action deemed necessary in the event guidelines are not followed.

By signing the Code of Ethics, the advisor agrees to uphold the current Constitution.

#### ARTICLE V - OFFICERS

A. Officers shall be nominated and elected at the September meeting.

- B. Officers shall serve a one-year term beginning in October with the possibility of re-election in following
- C. Members serving on the board for more than one year are eligible to hold an office.
- D. Specific Officer positions include:

President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer - The President and Vice-President shall represent the board at the Henry County Senior Fair Board meetings.

E. Committee Representatives include:

Two (2) Junior Livestock Sale Committee representatives; One (1) Advisory Council representatives.

- Committee representatives shall be elected by the board at the September meeting.
- F. The Executive Committee shall represent the board between regular meetings as necessary

#### ARTICLE VI - DUTIES OF OF-FICERS

A. The president shall preside at all meetings, including Executive Committee meetings and see that rules of the organization are enforced. He/she will represent the Junior Fair Board at the monthly meeting of the Henry County Senior Fair Board.

- B. The Vice-President shall assume duties of the President in his/her absence. He/she will represent the Junior Fair Board at the monthly meeting of the Henry County Senior Fair Board in the absence of the President.
- C. The Secretary shall keep an accurate record of all proceedings and business of the board. This includes attendance, minutes from all regularly scheduled meetings and correspon-
- D. The Treasurer shall receive all money in direction of the board and keeps an accurate record of all financial activity. This position will automatically chair the Awards Committee.
- E. The representatives to the Senior Fair Board shall represent the board at Senior Fair Board meetings to take care of any Junior Fair related activi-

#### ARTICLE VII - DEPARTMENT COMMITTEES

Each member shall serve on a Department. One individual shall serve as the Chair of Said Committees. The committees are as follows:

Beef, Dairy & Dairy Beef, Horses Dogs & Small Animals Poultry Swine Rabbits Sheen & Goats Awards, King & Queen+Youth Activities, \*Others as deemed necessary

ARTICLE VIII - DUTIES OF **MEMBERS** 

In order to be considered an active member of the Henry County Junior Fair Board, members will:

- Attend all scheduled and special meetings.
- Vote on matters within departments and the Junior Fair overall.
- Participate in work sessions and committee meetings as scheduled.
- See that exhibitor cards and other records are complete.
- Assist with the placing and judging of exhibits.
- Assist during fair week at shows assigned and other activities sponsored

by the Junior Fair Board.



# **Showman of Showmen Competition**

The Senior Showmanship winner in the horse, sheep, goat, beef, rabbit, poultry, dairy, dog and swine department vie for this top showmanship award. Added in 2023: Dogs have now been added to our Showman of Showmen rotation. A third-party judge will judge each showman and the ability of each of our showmen. Our showmen will accumulate points and the highest to-

tal points for the entire contest will determine the Overall Showman of Showmen.

The 2023 Showman of Showmen winner was Lauren Sattler. The daughter of Mark & Stephanie Sattler, Lauren is a senior in high school at Tinora High School. She represented her 4-H Club, County Line Livestock, and was the winner of the Senior Sheep Showmanship in 2023.

## Inspection and Health Requirements of Livestock Exhibited in Ohio

No prior health certificate inspection or blood testing is required. Veterinary checks are MANDATORY for all livestock exhibitors at 8:00pm on Wednesday, August 7. Procedures are as follows:

1. ALL MARKET animals will be weighed as they are unloaded. Please have animals un-blanketed to allow for an initial assessment of the animal as it crosses the scale. After being weighed, you may place animal/s in their assigned stall/pen. Market Animals will be inspected at the scale as they arrive on their respective show day. COMPLETED DRUG USE NO-TIFICATION FORMS will be electronically collected at the scale for all market animals. Please be sure all sections of the form are filled out and all signatures are completed.

2. All poultry, rabbit & equine animals MUST be in their assigned stall/pen promptly at 8:00pm uncovered. Exhibitors are to be with their project animal/exhibit promptly at 8:00pm. If the exhibitor is not able to be present due to work or practice or an emergency, they are to have an adult representative present who they authorize to sign and/or speak on their behalf. \*The veterinarian, Senior Fair Board Dept. Superintendent NOR Junior Fair Board representative will track down any exhibitor or their animal for this inspection. Exhibitors are expected

to have their animal/s in the barn and themselves or their adult representative present.

3. If any Junior Fair exhibitor's animal is excused for <u>health concerns</u> and the exhibitor has taken their trailer home or was trailered in by someone else, arrangements by Senior Fair Board will be made to assist the exhibitor in removing the animal.

The Senior Fair Board Dept. Superintendent will make any and all decisions with regards to animals in violation of rules and regulations of the department or exhibition.

There will be daily vet walk-thru inspections that are to be announced. A message board is available for exhibitors to identify problem animals to be examined by the fair veterinarian during this time. The vet will leave a message with a diagnosis attached to your pen if you are not present during examination. Any animals requiring attention other than the designed walk-thru inspection hour are subject to regular vet fees. Owners will be responsible for payment of such service.

## Outstanding Livestock Project Exhibitor

The Outstanding Livestock Project Exhibitor (OLPE) Program is open to all Junior Fair Exhibitors showing a beef, sheep, swine, rabbit, goat, poultry, horse, or dairy project. Points will be awarded in this three-part program in 4 age divisions. Each exhibitor will be ranked according to the points in all three areas they have been awarded. You must have scores in all three parts of the program in order to be considered for OLPE awards.

- 1. Exhibitor Skillathon score will be recorded (100 pt. possible)
- 2. Exhibitor MUST use their project animal in order to receive points for the Showmanship component
- 3. Exhibitor will receive points according to their placing in their show class. Points will be awarded only for the animal shown in the exhibitor's

showmanship class.

Scoring: Points are awarded as follows for showmanship and live show placing: 1st place = 100 pts.; 2nd place = 98 pts.; 3rd place = 96 pts.; 4th place = 94 pts.; 5th place = 92 pts.

\*BEGINNER: Youth 8 or 9 years of age (as of 1/1) and in the 3rd grade and first time in the project; \*JUNIOR Youth 9 to 11 years of age (as of 1/1) and second year or more in the project; \*INTERMEDIATE Youth 12 to 14 years of age (as of 1/1) - Compete in Intermediate Showmanship; \*SENIOR Youth 15 to 18 years of age (as of 1/1) - Compete in Senior Showmanship.

## Henry County Junior Fair Rules & Regulations

## SECTION I: GENERAL RULES & REGULATIONS

#### A. Entries in Junior Fair

- 1. All livestock entries for Junior Fair exhibitors are made through the Junior Fair Office (c/o OSU Extension Office, 104 E. Washington St. #302, Napoleon, OH 43545). There are no entry fees for Junior Fair exhibits. Members who wish to exhibit in open class are responsible for such entries and are governed by all open class regulations.
- 2. Junior Fair Entries must be submitted online through Fair Entry. Entries may be made from April 15th through June 15th. Late entry may be made June 16-20. However, you must submit a paper entry form to the OSU Extension-Henry County. Forms are available at the OSU Extension-Henry County office. A \$10.00 late fee will be assessed June 16-20. ABSOLUTELY NO LATE ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER JUNE 20th 4:30 pm.
- 3. Back-up animals can be weigh-in/tagged with the intention of using them in cases of a calamity. Only in cases of calamity may an animal already entered be switched out from the entry and replaced by a back-up animal. If a calamity does occur and no additional animal has been identified at the initial weigh-in/tagging/id day, the project animal CANNOT be replaced. The member's project is considered complete based on their skillathon score.
- 4. If the Junior Fair exhibitor's animal(s) have not been properly weighed-in/tagged/tattooed on the scheduled day OR other accommodations have not been made prior to the scheduled date, the member is ineligible to exhibit and/or compete in the Henry Junior Fair. See also Section II: #2

#### **B.** Exhibiting

1. All Junior Fair livestock exhibits must be in place by 6:30 p.m. on the evening preceding the first day of the fair. Entrance onto the fairgrounds on that day may begin at 10:00am. Weigh-ins will begin at 12Noon. All members are responsible for delivering their exhibits to and from the fair and maintaining an attractive exhibit area.

Organizations have specific space for displaying project work. Special interest, nutrition and clothing projects must be in club booths by 6:30pm Wednesday prior to opening day of the fair. 4-H booths will be judged on opening day of the fair. A theme is selected for the Henry County fair, which should be used for booth decorating. All exhibits are required to be displayed throughout the entire fair. Still project exhibits will be released at 5:00 pm (all items must be out of the booth building by 7:00 pm) on the last day of the fair (includes all 4-H and FFA booths). All livestock other than those involved in the livestock sale will be released at 5:00 pm on the last day of fair unless otherwise indicated to exhibitors

2. Eligibility Guidelines: Junior Fair exhibitors are 8 and in the 3rd grade (or 9 regardless of grade level) and not passed their 19th birthday as of the current year. 4-H members must be 8 and in the 3rd grade (or 9 regardless of grade level) and must not have passed their 19th birthday as of January 1st of the current year in order to be eligible to make Junior Fair entry/ies. FFA members are considered those who are enrolled in a high school

agricultural course or were enrolled in a high school agricultural course their senior year and are a current member of their school's FFA chapter. National FFA membership ID number will need to be provided at time of entry of project/s. FFA member must not have passed their 19th birthday as of January 1st of the current year in order to be eligible to make Junior Fair entry/ies.

#### 3.Grading:

a: All 4-H and FFA projects will receive a ribbon for their project rating. Categories of completion include: Superior, Outstanding, Good, Needs Improvement. At the pre-fair project judging, judges may use their discretion to select Best of Class or Honor awards within special interest project areas or other graded sub-divisions. Additional premiums are provided for these awards.

Please note: Flipgrid video submissions may be accepted if an alternative mode of judging is necessary.

b: All livestock project exhibitors are required to participate in skillathon evaluations. The skillathon evaluation will determine 51% of all final rating while 49% of the rating will be given on the project animal at the fair. The final project rating will be determined at the time the exhibitor is in the ring. The final rating will determine the premium amount awarded to the Junior Fair exhibitor. Skillathons are completed by Beef, Swine, Dairy, Sheep, Goats, Horses, Rabbits and Poultry project exhibitors prior to fair. No skillathons "make-up" will be provided after August 1st. Please contact Morgan Parcher, Extension Educator, 4-H if you cannot participate on the scheduled Livestock Skillathon date.

Please note: Flipgrid video submissions may be accepted if an alternative mode of judging is necessary.

- c: All Junior Fair livestock exhibitors must have an interview score in order to be eligible for placing in their respective specie show. Notice of ineligibility for placing due to skillathon score will be mailed to the exhibitor's parents by August 1st. The member may exhibit, however there he/she is not eligible for participation in the show classes. Judges will be asked to evaluate the exhibitor's animal at the pen/stall.
- d: Project members are to present their own project at judging and livestock shows. This includes participation in showmanship classes. Exceptions will be made only for exhibitors who may be physically impaired or who have animals of different species showing at the same time. In cases where the exhibitor is showing two different specie at the same time, the exhibitor may have another Junior Fair exhibitor show the second animal. In cases where the exhibitor is physically impaired (both temporarily and/or permanently) accommodations will be made according to the individual situation.
- 4. **Premiums**: Premiums are monetary awards presented by the Henry County Agricultural Society (Senior Fair Board) to Junior Fair exhibitors successfully exhibiting their projects(s) at the county fair. The Senior Fair Boar establishes the premium rates. Premiums are paid at the fair through the Junior Fair Office (hours to be announced) on the fairgrounds. Exhibitors or parent must sign for their premiums.
- 5. Ohio State Fair: Members and projects may be released from the coun-

ty fair to participate at the Ohio State Fair when dates overlap. All State Fair participants should notify the Junior Fair office prior to leaving the Henry County Fair. This can be done as soon as the exhibitor is knowledgeable of their participation/eligibility for State Fair.

## SECTION II: LIVESTOCK RULES & REGULATIONS

- A. OWNERSHIP: All animals taken as livestock projects must be owned by and in the possession of the respective member of his/her parents or guardian. Projects not in possession at the residence of the member must be approved by the member's advisor or Extension Educator, 4-H. Exception: Standard livestock leasing agreements are valid and will be accepted in the case of horse. dairy cattle, and beef breeding cattle project animals. In accordance with the Ohio State Fair and Henry County Fair regulations all animals exhibited must have been actually owned or cared for by the individual exhibitors on or before the designated possession dates as listed in each department's section (and in the 4-H Family Handbook).
- 1a: Ownership of an animal will be considered lost if the animal has been consigned or sold through an auction or any other transaction after the previously stated possession date.
- **1b:** Switching of animals or purchasing of animals after the respective possession date will result in the offending family being ineligible for Junior Fair competition for a period of one year.
- B. IDENTIFICATION: Weigh-In and Identification of project animal(s) are required for all Junior Fair market projects and rabbits. All animals are registered, weighed-in, and tagged/ tattooed on the Weigh-In/I.D. Day as listed in each department's section (and on the livestock requirement at-a-glance listing). Members who are unable to transport their project animal/s to the appropriate Weigh-In/ID event or have a legitimate conflict in scheduling (NOT SOLEY FOR CONVENIENCE) must make other arrangements prior to the scheduled id date. Such arrangements include: a Junior Fair Board Advisor tagging said animal/s for a \$25.00 fee at the member's home/location of animal. Additional tags \$5.00 each; Tattooing of rabbits include a \$25.00 fee regardless of the number of rabbits.
- C. OHIO DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE REQUIRE-MENTS As determined by the Henry Co. Agricultural Society:
- 1: All livestock exhibitors must have their animal(s) visually inspected by the fair veterinarian during inspection time (8pm) on Wednesday prior to opening day of the fair. The exhibitor or a representative must be present with their animal.
- 2: Drug use notification forms (901-19-06) are required for MARKET beef, sheep, swine, goats, poultry, rabbits, lactating dairy cows and lactating dairy goats. DUNForms must be completed electronically. Should any of these market animals receiving medical treatment during fair, the project members must complete a paper Drug Use Notification form and turn it into the Junior Fair Office on the fairgrounds.
- 3: ALL ANIMALS ARE TO ENTER THE FAIR DRUG FREE.
  - D. SPECIFIC RULES:
- 1: Dehorning All Junior Fair market

animals should be properly dehorned and castrated. Animals receiving such treatments MUST be healed before attending the fair. \*See specie Rules and Regulations\*

- 2: Class entries Junior Fair members may enter livestock classes according to limits specified in each department's Rules& Regulations section of the Junior Fair handbook. All animals entered into breeding classes must be either purebred or show the recognized characteristics of a specific breed.
- 3: Showing/Exhibiting: It is recognized that 4-H. FFA. Boy Scouts. Girl Scouts Farmers Union and Farm Bureau Youth (a.k.a. Junior Fair participants) can develop positive relationships between parent and child. It is beneficial to have vouth organization members and their parents work together to accomplish goals. The Ohio Dept. of Agriculture has Ohio's Livestock Tampering Exhibition Rules for exhibitors to follow, that must be adhered to locally. For this reason, actual work on a member's project must be completed and exhibited by the member involved. Fitting, trimming, and otherwise preparing an animal for show must be the responsibility of the youth who is the member of 4-H, FFA, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, or Farm Bureau Youth, Although parents, club leaders and others may offer advice and guidance, work done on Junior Fair animals at the fairgrounds must be completed by the youth involved. No exhibitor shall enter an animal in a competition in the Henry County Junior Fair that has been handled, fitted, groomed, shown, or exhibited by another person other than a member of the exhibitor's immediate family (parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, brother, sister) or another Junior exhibitor while on the Henry County Fairgrounds during the fair.

\*No exhibitor, their family or any party involved in unethical practices shall be permitted to exhibit at the Henry County fair, having been banned for disciplinary or ethical reasons from other county, independent or state fair for a period commensurate with the ban.

In any Junior Fair livestock show, no adults other than assigned ring people will be allowed in the show arena/area to provide any verbal or physical assistance. Exception to this rule will be made on an individual basis in regard to permanent/temporary disabilities of an exhibitor and/or in case of multiple projects being exhibited in one class.

## E. Tampering, Unethical Practices, or Misrepresentation:

- 1: Tampering and/or misrepresentation as to breeding, age, ownership, or other irregularity in showing will be considered fraud and deception. Any premiums, trophies, awards, or sale money will be withheld if the exhibitor is proven to have tampered or misrepresented his/her project animal.
- 2: Unethical fitting is prohibited in junior market livestock shows unless those grooming practices are permitted under rule 901-19-33 of the Administrative Code: A. Using any substance to enhance or change the color of the livestock, including the livestock's hide or hooves; B. Adding any substance externally to build up, change or alter the shape or conformation of the livestock, including by way of example but not limited to rope, false hair, graph-

ite, hemp, and powders; C. Pigmented grooming aides or materials; and D. Slick clippings or body shaving of market hogs except on ears and tails.

- 3: Drenching of all livestock is prohibited, except for a medical condition diagnosed by a licensed veterinarian. 'Drenching' means the act of using an instrument, including a bottle, placed in an animal's mouth to orally administer liquid, food or any other substance.
- 4: Penalties for unethical practices shall include forfeiture of Junior Fair premiums. Awards, or other benefits and their penalties as Senior Fair Board deems appropriate. Proper authorities will be notified of any legal infractions.

5: No exhibitor, their immediate family or party involved in unethical practices shall be permitted to exhibit at the Henry County fair, having been banned for disciplinary or ethical reasons from any other county, independent or state fairs for a period commensurate with the ban. ALL ODA Rules & Regulations will apply.

#### F. Showmanship Classes:

Project members are to present their own project animal in showmanship classes. If the member has weighed-in/ ID'd more than one project animal at the initial weigh-in/ID time, the member is to use the project animal they are exhibiting for Junior Fair. When an exhibitor has both a market and breeding project, he/she may use either project animal exhibited in Junior Fair for showmanship.

1: Divisions for Showmanship include:

**Senior=** Youth 15-18 years of age as of Jan. 1 of current year

Intermediate=Youth 12-14 years of age as of Jan.1 of current year

Junior= Youth 9 (and 2nd year in project)- 11 years of age as of Jan. 1 of current year

Beginner= 8 or 9 years old AND in the 3rd grade as of Jan. 1 of current year AND first year in the project

Horse Age divisions are those used in the Uniform Rules for 4-H Horse Shows: Juniors= 8/9-13 years old:

**Seniors=** 14-18 years of old. Please review each department for any specific showmanship details.

Additionally, PeeWee and Adult Showmanship may be offered following the Junior Fair classes.

Pee Wee Youth 5-8 years of age as of Jan.1 of current year; Adults- Individuals 19 years of age and older as of Jan.1.

- 2: Showmanship class order will be: Senior, Intermediate, Junior, and Beginner
- 3: Exhibitors who wish to participate in Showmanship MUST enter the appropriate class when making their livestock entry. No sign-ups will be taken on Show day.
- 4: Junior Fair horse project exhibitors may compete in First Year, Junior, Senior Showmanship classes according to age of the member as of Jan. 1 of the current year in accordance of the Uniform Horse Show Rules. Pony classes are also available with any age level being eligible to exhibit in.
- 5: Senior Showmanship winners from the project areas of: Beef, Sheep, Swine, Poultry, Rabbits, Dairy, Horses and Goats are eligible to participate in and win the Showman of Showmen Contest. Winners in the Showman of Showmen Contest may win two consecutive years. Winners with 2 consecutive

## Henry County Junior Fair Rules & Regulations (continued)

wins are ineligible for a period of one year. Horses: A first place showman who is of senior level age in Draft, Pony, Contester's Showmanship, Senior Western Showmanship and/or Senior English Showmanship in the horse department will participate in a senior showmanship run-off, if necessary, to determine the participant for the Showman of Showmen contest.

**6:** Any First-Place winner of the Junior or Intermediate Showmanship Class (beef, sheep, goat, swine, dairy, rabbit, poultry or horse depts.) may choose to move into the next age level for showmanship. Exhibitors choosing to do so, however, will not be allowed to move back to a lower age level category in subsequent years.

#### G. Quality Assurance:

All livestock project exhibitors must complete a Quality Assurance program annually as per Ohio Dept. of Agriculture mandate. Henry County Junior Fair exhibitors must complete their Quality Assurance education by June 25th annually. Testing out of Quality Assurance is available ONLY to 15-18 year old exhibitors and must be completed by June 25th in the year of testing out.

- **H. ODA Rules:** All Ohio Dept. of Agriculture rules adopted after handbook printing are available to all livestock Exhibitors upon request.
- 1: Testing of Grand/Reserve Grand Champions= Samples will be held on file for 3rd and 4th place animals in the Grand Champion Drives of Steers, Hogs, Sheep and Goats in case of discrepancies with the Grand Champion and/or Reserve Grand Champion
- I. Barn meetings: When Barn Meetings are held in a department prior to the start of fair, exhibitors are expected to attend. In some departments an information letter is sent out prior to fair. Please review the 4-H Flashes July/August newsletter for further details.

## SECTION III: LIVESTOCK SALE RULES & REGULATIONS

A. General Rules & Regulation of the Sale

- 1. Henry County Junior Fair Livestock shows are partial TERMINAL shows (901-19-02). This means all market animals exhibited (market lambs, market steers, market goats, market hogs, broilers, turkeys, market ducks, meat pen of rabbits, single roaster, and market geese) must be consigned for slaughter or market in accordance to this administrative code.
- 2. The exhibitor or parent must be present as their animal/s are being loaded out. Times for load-outs if other than during sale will be posted prior to sale day.
- 3. All market projects must be sold. One animal per exhibitor may be sold in the sale ring. In case of multiple market projects, only one animal will go through the sale ring. The other market animal(s) MUST be consigned to market at the appraised price OR it may go custom slaughtered/processed by the exhibitor (as long as the owner has made prior arrangements for custom). In the latter case, the animal must leave the fairgrounds and go directly to the slaughterhouse.
- **4.** In cases of multiple <u>Grand</u> Champion(s) and/or <u>Reserve Grand</u> Champion(s) owned by a single exhibitor, both animals will be sold in the sale ring. The exhibitor shall designate, prior to

the sale, which animal he/she will keep the proceeds from. The exhibitor will receive the market value of the second <u>Grand/Reserve Grand</u> Champion animal that goes through the sale ring. Premiums awarded above market value on the second animal shall be allocated to the Livestock Sale Committee in support of the Junior Fair Program.

\*Grand & Reserve Grand Champions that go through the sale include: Market Beef, Market Dairy Beef, Market Hogs, Market Goat (Meat Type), Market Goat (Dairy Type), Market Lamb, Market Broilers, Market Turkeys, Market Goose, Market Duck, Market Rabbit- Roasters, Market Rabbit- Pen of Three.

- **5.** Youth who enroll in and exhibit both a market project and a dairy project, must sell their market project i the sale and will not be included in the Gallon of Milk.
- 6. Animals that are sold in the sale ring will be consigned MARKET or CUSTOM SLAUGHTER. "Market" indicates the buyer does not want the animal personally and thus, the animal goes to market. "Custom" indicates that the buyer wants the meat and therefore will pay the value of the meat plus the amount over market value that they bid and the animal goes to their prearranged processing facility.
- 7. All exhibitors must wear appropriate show attire (according to their specie) for the livestock sale.
- **B. Sale animal Rotation:** Sale order rotates yearly with the first specie sold the previous year moving to the bottom of the rotation list. Sale committee reserves the right to group similar species for ease in support buyer hauling.

#### C. Possession & Responsibility:

- 1. All Grand and Reserve Grand Champions remain in the custody of the Senior Fair Board upon being named as such. Care of the animal must be continued by the Junior Fair exhibitor. All ODA Rules & Regulations apply.
- 2. Grand and Reserve Grand Champion Market Steers, Market Hogs, Market Lambs, Market Poultry, Market Rabbits and Market Goats must go directly to the designated slaughterhouse/designated market immediately following the sale.
- **3.** All other market livestock remain the property of the Junior Fair member until it is loaded on the buyer's truck.
- \*The Junior Fair member accepts all liability until the animals are loaded onto the truck. \*It is expected that the member be present to take the animal thru the ring and to the truck. In cases of physical impairment of the exhibitor OR a justifiable reason, another designated Junior Fair exhibitor may take the animal through the sale ring. Please notify the exhibitor's department advisor of the change in advance.
- 4. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to sign-up any multiple market animals he/she may have by 5:00p Monday evening of the fair to either market or custom slaughter designations. The heaviest animal is defaulted into the livestock sale. \*Only animals exhibited in their respective shows are to be on the fairgrounds and thus no "extra" animals are allowed to be put on market buyer trucks.
- **5.** A fee of \$10.00 is charged for market animals sold in the sale to cover livestock sale expenses. Expenses in-

clude cost of mailings, flyers, thank-you signs, livestock check-off programs, and Grand/Reserve grand Champion Livestock banners.

- **6.** It is the responsibility of each member to contact potential buyers for their animals. The Junior Fair Sale Committee works to notify buyers, old and new, of the upcoming livestock sale and the youth involved. Buyers are essentially rewarding exhibitors above the market price for their hard work and involvement in the Junior Fair.
- 7. It is mandatory for all Junior Fair exhibitors who sell an animal to mail thank-you notes written to their buyer/s. Please note: A single picture of your Thank-you notes/letters (grouped in the photo) in their envelopes, addressed to each buyer is to be emailed to the Sale Coordinator no later than September 15th. Send Emails to: henrylsc@googlegroups.com.

Exhibitor livestock sale checks are mailed to each member as thank-you note/letter confirmation pictures are received and provided the buyer has paid his/her bill. The goal of the Junior Fair Livestock Sale Committee is to have checks issued within 30 days after the sale providing each buyer has paid his/her own bill and/or the member has turned his/her thank you note/s.

**8.** Any questions or discrepancies of rules regarding the Junior Fair Livestock Sale will be decided upon by the Henry

County Livestock Sale Committee with approval of the Henry County Agricultural Society.

**9.** In the event an animal is unable to be exhibited at the fair, any add-on premiums already received will be returned to the buyer/supporter.

10. In cases where an exhibitor's market animal dies any time after the official opening hour of the first day of the Henry County Fair, the exhibitor will be allowed to go through the livestock sale.

## SECTION IV: GRIEVANCE PROCEDURES

In the question of any Junior Fair rule violation, the following due process will be used

- A. A written grievance (use form provide) must be submitted at the Junior Fair Office within 24 hours of the occurrence in a sealed envelope, accompanied by a protest fee of \$25.00, which is retained by the Junior Fair Board if the protest is not sustained.
- **B.** The Grievance Committee will notify the party(ies) grieved against. The party(ies) will have the opportunity to reply in writing within 24 hours of notification. Written correspondence shall be turned in to the Junior Fair Office on the fair-grounds.
- C. The grievance will be taken under advisement by the Grievance Committee within 48 hours after notification. Advisement: A spokesperson from each side of the grievance will have the op-

portunity to present their statement to the Grievance Committee. The exhibitor and/or party)ies) involved may be questioned by the Grievance Committee.

- 1. Unless specific penalty is stated in a rule/regulation, the Grievance Committee can consider any of the following: Lower the exhibitor's level. Withhold the exhibitor's premium. Declare an exhibitor ineligible for awards. Recall awards received by the exhibitor. Revoke State Fair showing rights. Ban exhibitor from showing in future Henry County Fairs. Revoke exhibitor's right to participate in the livestock sale.
- 2. All parties will be expected to abide by the decision(s) made by the Grievance Committee. Once a situation is acted upon by the Grievance Committee, the decision (s) made by the committee will be final.
- **3.** The Grievance Committee meetings shall be taped.
- 4. The Junior Fair Grievance Committee shall consist of at least, but not limited to: Senior Fair Board Reps to the Junior Fair Board. The Department Committee Chair (or his/her alternate representative) from which the grievance is in. If the grievance affects the Junior Fair overall, then all representatives from the Department Committees will attend. A quorum of advisors from the Junior Fair Board, 1 FFA Advisor, 4-Hdvisory Council President (his/her alternate).
